The former Military Net now has a new name and new purpose! It has been revised and renamed as the result of falling interest and lower attendance over the last few years and because of suggestions made during past Military Nets. The “News and History Net” which is taking the place of the Military Net on repeater VE3TWO, should be more interesting and much broader in scope and should attract more Amateurs and listeners as well. The first net was held on September 4, 2001. The new preamble reads as follows.

“Good evening ladies and gentlemen. This is _____, and I’m your Net Control station for this evenings ”News and History Net“. We extend thanks to the Ottawa Valley Mobile Radio Club Inc. for the use of their repeater VE3TWO. We invite you to check-in every Tuesday evening at 2000 hours, except for July & August.

This Amateur Radio net was formerly called the “Military Net” and originated about 1982 on repeater VE3URC which was located at Uplands Canadian Forces Base Amateur Radio Club. The “Military Net” was originally established for members of the armed forces. It has subsequently evolved over the years and in the interests of providing a better net covering a broader range of subjects, the name of the net has been changed to “The News and History Net”.

This net is open to all Amateurs who wish to speak about current news, events, historical subjects or local amateur radio events and activities. All Amateurs are invited to check in and to provide their views on current events or history, particularly related to but not confined to, current Canadian affairs and history. You are also encouraged to share your interesting positive experiences about life and stories or to discuss subjects of general interest. We welcome any amateurs who would like to check in, provide comments and join in the discussion.

If you would like to serve as a net control station for this net, please telephone the Net Manager, Larry Wilcox VE3WEH, 747-5565.

SEPTEMBER 1991 RAMBLER

Our exceptionally warm and sunny summer has passed, our Field Day was an enjoyable and fun event, and fall is soon to arrive, the trees are changing back to their natural colour already. It is time to think about all the Amateur radio activities which are starting up again, building, repairing and putting up antennas, attending our general meetings and checking into the local and HF nets once again.

Speaking of nets, Jerry Wells VE3CDS (SK) wrote the cover feature this month and covered "Nets - For the Newcomer." He gave an in depth description of all the 2 Metre FM nets in the area, including, the Ottawa Amateur Radio Club's "Capital City FM Net," Monday evenings at 8pm on VE2CRA, 146.940 MHz, which includes the "Swap Net," managed by Ed VE3GX, "The Military Net" sponsored by Frank Collins VE3MSC, on VE3TWO, 147.300 MHz, Tuesday at 8pm, our "Wise Owl Net" on VE3TWO repeater at 8pm on Friday night, controlled by Leo VE3NVL. He also covered the "Kingsmere Traffic Net" on repeater VE3KPG, 147.360 MHz with Net Manager Devere, VE3AJN and the daily 6.45pm "Champlain Mini-net on VE3STP, 147.06 MHz which runs about 15 minutes. With the exception of the Military Net which has evolved into the "News & History Net," all of these nets are still on the air so you can check into any of them again starting this month. Jerry was a very effective and amiable net controller on many of these nets for many years. These nets are there for your pleasure and can help you keep in touch with the local Amateur community. The Net Managers and Net Controllers appreciate your participation and look forward to hearing you check in. So, dust off your 2 Metre rig, charge up the batteries or turn on the power supply and enjoy these various nets, you might be surprised to hear some old friends and can catch up on local Amateur radio news and events or even learn some trivial bits of information about Amateur radio or local or world history.

The Secretary's Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on June 20, 1991 at the Multi-service Centre, 1480 Heron Road, contained several significant events. Life Membership Certificates were presented by President Doug Carswell VE3ATY, to Ralph Cameron VE3BBM and Bill Wilson VE3NR. Both were unable to be present at the May Awards. The annual membership dues were proposed and approved at \$15 and there was a reduction of the dues to \$10 for any member living at the same address. It pays to stay together.

Charles King VE3PDK, Newsletter Editor, wrote a full page article entitled "A Radio Course With a Difference." He covered the issues of teaching Amateur Radio and how it was going to take place. Doug Carswell VE3ATY undertook to write the electronic theory for a new manual, "Amateur Radio for Beginners" for the OVMRC Amateur Radio Course. He was assisted by John Pope VE3ACI and Dennis Rule VE3JGR who were proofreading for technical accuracy and clarity. Pat Brewer VE3KJQ taught the

Radio Act and Regulations and prepared material on this subject. Pat was working with Jerry Wells VE3CDS on the Morse code training, so he prepared the code audio tapes and instructions for their use. Brice Wightman VE3EDR was looking after Radio Operations and analyzing the students' CW progress and prepared text and reference material on Operating procedures, etiquette and safety. Chuck King VE3PDK, edited the manuscript, typeset it and prepared master pages for printing. Allen Ablett VE3SUP arranged for printing the manual and put together the binders for the students. They subsequently produced a very marketable manual, CW tapes and lesson plans. The manual was revised and issued again and is still in use by the OVMRC. Registration night on September 3 resulted in twenty-one candidates for the course and more were expected to attend the first class night on September 10 at the Laurentian High School.

The Annual Financial Report and Audit for 1990-1991 appeared in the September RAMBLER. The Total Revenue was \$8,732.36 with Total Expenses of \$7,223.50 so there was an expected income of \$1,508.86.

Bob Sharp VE3YBC wrote a short article "I Passed the Test! Now What? He encouraged the newly licenced to become involved locally, to volunteer for events such as Field Day and communications for other events and to check-in on the various nets to find out what is going on in the local Amateur community. Bob wrote that he learned more in the past six months about Amateur radio through the greatest source of knowledge at the end of his antenna - fellow Amateurs. Bob also covered "The Son cycle Classic," a Halifax to Toronto cycle tour which rolled through our region during the last week of August. Amateur Radio was there providing communications. He took on the task of Area Coordinator and acted as a mobile station also. They were assisting fellow Amateurs who were participating in the tour. Doug VE3RNC was one of the cyclists and Monica KB7FIT and Steve KB7HMM were driving support vehicles for the tour. They used three repeaters, VE2RM from St Andres to Rockland, VE3TEL from Rockland to North Gore and VE3ORA from North Gore to Perth. This event was successful with assistance from Don VE3RM, from Montreal ARC, Wayne VE3WDP of PARC, who operated the base stations, and the mobile stations operated by Roger VE3KKR from ECC ARES, Cornwall, Peter VE3SOF, Keith VE3IMT and Doug VE2VMS. The manager of the tour, Tim Kneefield said the Ottawa area Amateurs did a great job. Bob sent special thanks to Ed VE3GX for supplying information via packet radio, Devere VE3AJN, Net Manager for the Kingsmere Traffic Net and her operator who handle heavy traffic throughout the tour and to the Pioneer Amateur Radio Club for the use of VE3TEL repeater which was tied up for two full days.

In my last column, I noted the July-August 1991 issue of the RAMBLER contained a replica of the winning OVMRC QSL Card

RAC delegation preparing for IARU Region 2 Conference in Guatemala City

Date: August 31, 2001

In October, delegates from national Amateur Radio societies from all over the Americas will be meeting at the IARU Region 2 Conference in Guatemala City. These conferences are held once every three years in each of the three IARU Regions.

As a member society of the International Amateur Radio Union, Radio Amateurs of Canada has allocated funding for RAC President Oelke to attend the October 2001 IARU Region II Triennial Conference. To strengthen the Canadian presence, the following volunteers have agreed to join President Oelke in Guatemala City at their own expense; RAC Vice President of Regulatory Affairs, Tim Ellam, VE6SH, RAC Quebec Director Daniel Lamoureux, VE2KA and Jacqueline Lamoureux, VE2AX. President Oelke will act as head of the Canadian Delegation.

On the conference agenda will be some very important issues including the WRC 2003 items on the proposed realignment of the 40 metre band and possible changes to the ITU regulations governing Amateur Radio. RAC has submitted papers seeking support for the Canadian position on both of these questions. RAC has also submitted a paper seeking regional support for its application for a new amateur band at 135 kHz.

There will also be some important administrative matters on the conference agenda. There is a proposal to revise and update the by-laws and constitution of IARU Region 2. There is also a proposal to increase the size of the Region 2 Executive Committee.

These items have been discussed at length by members of the RAC Board, in order to provide guidance and direction to the delegation.

RAC supports the proposed by-law changes, but is opposed to any increase in size of the IARU-Region 2 Executive Committee at this time.

Jerry Wells OVMRC Amateur of the Year

The OVMRC Inc. has established the Jerry Wells Award in 1997 in recognition of Jerry Wells VE3CDS, 1928-1997, a live member and Silent Key. Jerry received the “Amateur of the Year Award in June 1997 for his contribution of time, effort and devotion throughout the year to the Amateur Radio Course, his work as Delegated Examiner and his management of Amateur Radio Station, VE3JW, at the Canada Science and Technology Museum. The Award was subsequently renamed the “Jerry Wells OVMRC Amateur of the Year Award in his honour.

Please read the Award criteria before completing the nomination form.

Selection Criteria and Process

- The submission of nominees and selection of the award winner will be based on the following criteria.
- Each nominee for the award must have been a fully paid up member of the OVMRC and a licensed Radio Amateur during the most recently completed club fiscal year starting July 1, 2000 and ending June 30, 2001 (Award Year).
- Nomination must be received in writing, in the required format, prior to, or during the regular September meeting. Each nomination must be supported by not less than two Full Members who were in good standing during the Award Year, and must include a short narrative description of the nominee’s contribution to Amateur Radio as specified below:
- To be eligible, nominee must have made a significant contribution during the Award Year to further any of the objectives of the OVMRC by:
 - Contributing to the interest, study and progress of the science and art of Amateur Radio with particular emphasis on mobile operations;
 - Co-operating with and assisting the civil authorities to the fullest extent possible in any emergency; or by
 - Fostering good will and understanding among Radio Amateurs.
- The eligibility of nominees will be verified by the Executive.
- The names of the nominees and the short narrative descriptions provide by the nominators will be published in the October issue of the Rambler.
- The Award winner will be determined by SECRET BALLOT by all members attending the regular meeting held on October. Two Full Members in good standing who are not nominees or nominators will be appointed by the President to scrutinize and tabulate the ballots.
- The “Jerry Wells OVMRC Amateur of the Year Award,” consisting of a suitably engraved plaque and an engraved chrome plated iambic paddle keyer, or equivalent, will be presented to the winner at the November regular meeting.
